

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A MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As we all know, 2020 was a difficult year for everyone, both individually and economically. PACE worked tirelessly over the last twelve months without closing our doors to ensure we were able to continue the work towards our mission and provide support to those in our community who are most vulnerable to the challenges we are all facing. It was imperative that we as an organization continued to offer our services to our clients, while keeping all parties safe as we faced the effects of the pandemic together. Furthermore, the mental toll the pandemic has taken on those who were incarcerated was traumatic and significant.

Throughout 2020, we saw a level of civil unrest that has been dormant for decades. The unjust murders of Breonna Taylor, George Floyd, and countless other citizens brought attention to the major flaws within our justice system that ultimately brought Americans together to voice their concerns through protests and advocacy for Black Lives Matter. Lives been lost, and countless families and individuals have seen devastation brought by the unjust acts of those who are meant to serve and protect. PACE has continued to witness systemic racism within our nation's criminal justice system, and can attest to how crucial it is to have





Navigating COVID-19

We Kept Our Doors Open During Quarantine

Because our clients are often those with the most severe basic needs and are also often excluded from accessing the help they need, we knew how important it was to keep our doors open. That's why we adapted our services to continue both in person and via virtual appointments to protect our staff and guests and to provide assistance to all who needed it.



We Provided Relief to Our Neighbors


Thanks to the Central Indiana COVID-19 Community Economic Relief Fund (C-CERF), a fund created by several funding partners in Central Indiana who aim to make a crucial difference for residents negatively affected by COVID-19, we partnered with Edna Martin Christian Center through the Martindale-Brightwood 7 Initiative (MB7) to help as many of our neighbors as possible in their time of need.



Voter Registration Efforts


From September 3 to October 5 we partnered with ACLU of Indiana, GoVoteIndy, and Women4Change Indiana to help 147 of our clients and neighbors navigate the voter registration process and ensured that anyone impacted by incarceration was registered to vote in the 2020 election.





We Became a Regional Recovery Hub

In partnership with Indiana Recovery Network, a program of Mental Health America of Indiana and DMHA, we expanded our Recovery Resource Center to serve as a Regional Recovery Hub and are one of many in the state that are connecting Hoosiers with mental health and substance use disorders to treatment and recovery supports.



We Began Harm Reduction Services

In partnership with the Indiana State Department of Health, we increased outreach efforts to the Marion County's Safe Syringe Access and Support Program, Marion County Jail, and Indiana Department of Correction facilities. We also facilitated a harm reduction training series with trainers from the Midwest Harm Reduction Institute for all PACE recovery support staff and other peer support professionals in the community through our Recovery Resource Center.



We Became A Narcan Distribution Site

We have officially been designated as a Naloxone (or Narcan) distribution site by Overdose Lifeline in order to prevent opioid overdoses in the surrounding communities. The Narcan is distributed in a nasal spray form that anybody can use to reverse the harmful effects of opioids and potentially save someone from an overdose.

We Celebrated National Recovery Month

Our annual Recovery Celebration went virtual this year on September 19 on Facebook Live (<u>facebook.com/IndyPace</u>) in partnership with the Indianapolis Recorder Newspaper to honor recovering individuals and families and promote our community's prevention, treatment, and recovery programs.



We Held Our Annual Fundraiser Virtually

On October 22 we held our 3rd annual "Artspoken: Expression without reserve" fundraiser on Facebook Live (facebook.com/IndyPace) and raised a grand total of \$24,100! We would like to graciously thank everyone who helped make this event possible and who supported us during our first-ever virtual fundraiser.



We Participated in Giving Tuesday

Giving Tuesday is an annual global day of giving and occurs on the first Tuesday following Thanksgiving. On December 1 we were excited to see supporters give directly via our website, host fundraisers on Facebook, and make PACE their charity of choice on Amazon.com. In total we were so grateful to raise \$705 to support our programs and services.



OUR STRATEGIC PLANS

As PACE continues to provide support, service, and resources to the men, women and families working to re-enter the community, our need for a larger office and classroom space has grown exponentially in the past few years. We have operated in the Martindale-Brightwood neighborhood for nearly two decades, and hope to remain in this area.

A larger facility will allow us to serve more individuals, provide a wider variety of services, and set our clients up for a higher level of success. This is a goal we have been working towards for the past few years, but need help to make moving possible. In addition to expanding our space, we have three additional goals.

Expanding our pre-release services.

Pre-release services originally began when PACE was founded in 1960, however a lack funding forced our organization to shift our focus to exclusively post-release services. With support from donors like you, we are anxious to reignite these services to lower recidivism rates and make our community stronger than ever before.

Beginning transportation services and employment retention supports. Limited transportation and entry level wages presents a threat to our clients' success, so we are actively partnering with The Wilson Sheehan Lab for Economic Opportunities (LEO) at Notre Dame to measure our work and potentially provide additional measures of financial support to our clients soon.

Advocacy. One of the most important things we are prioritizing is our advocacy efforts. Thanks to a generous grant from United Way of Central Indiana, we are in the process of training our clients to become leaders and advocate for others in similar situations who may not be receiving the level of support they need.

By creating a coalition of individuals who understand the re-entry process and impact of incarceration, they can share the importance of re-entry services to legislatures and work together to fight for improvement of the criminal justice system.



BRADLY A. NOEL RECOVERY FUND

The Bradly A. Noel Recovery Fund was created to commemorate the life of a former PACE client who devoted his time to advocate and support other members in our community who were facing the uphill battle of the recovery process. Bradly was an active member of the PACE family who understood the effects of addiction firsthand and used the experience of his own struggles to give back to the community to help PACE advocate the message that addiction is a health issue, not a crime.

This fund was developed to assist in the enhancement, expansion and delivery of recovery support services that are provided at our Recovery Resource Center (RRC), the only RRC dedicated to the justice population in the state. It is estimated that every year nearly 21 million Americans have at least one addiction, and only 10% of those individuals receive treatment.

Along with this data, 90% of inmates do not receive treatment for addiction, which correlates to 75% of those individuals being re-arrested for a new crime upon release. In Indiana alone, studies show that roughly 1 in 12 Hoosiers are affected by substance use disorder, meaning nearly half a million Indiana residents are left vulnerable to the ramifications of addiction if they are unable to receive the support and resources needed to begin the journey to recovery.



Sadly, in 2020, we lost three clients to overdose, and these numbers do not include the friends and families of those directly affected, making the number of individuals in need of support substantially higher.

In 2020, \$3592.89 was donated to the Bradly A. Noel Recovery Fund. These funds that were so graciously granted to PACE by our supporters will help cover the cost of transportation assistance for bus passes, gas cards, housing assistance for traditional housing, assistance with utilities or household items, parental education classes, food assistance gift cards, and other basic needs requested by our clients served in the Recovery Resource Center. Please support us with a gift to the Bradly A. Noel Recovery Fund as we fight alongside our clients and continue to challenge the stigma that has long been associated with addiction.

We would also like to thank Bradly's friends and family who continue to support Bradly's fund and encourage others to do the same.

removing barriers

COVID-19 RELIEF FUND

2020 presented a great deal of uncharted territory. In the US alone, there have been nearly 31 million cases and half a million people have lost their lives. In Indiana, Hoosiers have seen nearly 700,000 cases and over 13,000 deaths as a result of COVID-19. A particularly vulnerable group was and continues to be those currently incarcerated. Being unable to social distance properly in jails allowed COVID-19 to run rampant throughout the incarcerated population.

Studies show that 40 of the 50 largest outbreaks recorded in the United States happened in jails or prisons. Included with the devastation, was a sky rocket in the unemployment rates across the country and in Indiana. Many of our clients and their families saw reduction in work hours, placement on furlough, lack of childcare options, and layoffs. As a result, PACE developed the COVID-19 relief fund to help our clients and other individuals within our community facing economic hardships due to the pandemic.

The fund allows PACE to provide assistance with rent and mortgage payments, utilities assistance, internet access assistance, phone bill payments, medical co-pays, medically necessary prescription costs, daycare assistance, transportation via bus passes and gas cards, and household items such as cleaning supplies, toilet paper, and paper towels. 100% of all donations to this fund goes directly to our clients in need.



As the world returns to normal, we know barriers will continue to be exacerbated for our clients and we anticipate a continued need to assist our clients and their families in overcoming them for years to come.

Our donors have allowed us to be a lifeline to those in our community facing vulnerable conditions, and often times PACE is the only resource they have to obtain the most basic necessities. We cannot express enough the amount of gratitude we have for our donor who have allowed us to keep our doors open and continue to provide support and assistance through the trying time of the pandemic.
